Keynote

A. Lorris Betz, MD, PhD Senior Vice President Emeritus of Health Sciences, University of Utah Chair of the Board of Directors,

Dr. A. Lorris Betz began his term at the University of Utah in June 1999 as Senior Vice President of Health Sciences, Dean of the School of Medicine, and Chief Executive Officer of University of Utah Health Care. He holds faculty appointments in the department of Pediatrics, and the department of Neurobiology and Anatomy, and he twice served as Interim President of the University. Following his retirement in May 2012, Dr. Betz was named Senior Vice President Emeritus of Health Sciences and he was awarded an honorary Doctor of Science degree by the University. Dr. Betz currently serves as Chair of the Board of the Association of American Medical Colleges.



Class Profile

This exceptional group of 54 students was selected from an applicant pool of more than 3,500. The inaugural class has 24 women and 30 men from 14 states, including 23 students from Michigan and 15 from California. They represent 35 colleges and universities from across the country. Three students are graduates of Western Michigan University and two are from Kalamazoo College. One member of the class attended college as a Kalamazoo Promise scholarship recipient.

Milestones

Oct. 25, 2007	During Academic Convocation/State of the University Address, President John M. Dunn announced that WMU will engage in discussion about the possibility and potential of a medical school at WMU.
Jan. 25, 2011	Hal B. Jenson, MD, MBA from Tufts University School of Medicine is named founding dean.
Mar. 22, 2011	A \$100 million cash gift, the largest ever made to a Michigan college or university, is made to WMU and served as the foundational funding for the medical school.
Dec. 8, 2011	At the WMU Board of Trustees meeting, William U. Parfet, the chairman and chief executive officer of MPI Research and the great-grandson of W.E. Upjohn, MD, donated to WMU a 330,000 sq. ft. building located in downtown Kalamazoo that serves as the home of the medical school.
Oct. 12, 2012	During the groundbreaking ceremony at the site of the new medical school on the W.E. Upjohn M.D. Campus, Dean Hal Jenson announced that the medical school was granted preliminary accreditation from the Liaison Committee on Medical Education, permitting the new medical school to move forward to recruit its first class of medical students.
Mar. 11, 2014	Western Michigan University announced the new medical school will be named in honor of Dr.


Homer Stryker, a WMU alumnus and founder of Stryker Corporation. The naming recognized the

donors of the 2011 foundational \$100 million gift, Stryker's granddaughter, Ronda Stryker, and her husband William Johnston, a WMU trustee. WMU also announced a separate corporate gift from Stryker Corporation for the medical school that

bears its founder's name.

Aug. 18, 2014 The inaugural medical school class of 54 students arrived and began the CLEAR curriculum to prepare exceptional clinicians, leaders, educators, advocates, and researchers of tomorrow.







SIMULATION CENTER

The Simulation Center is the largest regional academic simulation center in southwest Michigan. Realistic simulated medical scenarios are utilized to allow learners to practice recognizing essential data within complex situations, to initiate timely treatment, and to coordinate medical care as teams.

- More than 24,000 sq. ft. designed with a virtual hospital and an ambulatory clinic.
- Virtual hospital with eight simulation rooms and a 20-seat control room.
- Virtual clinic with 12 patient exam rooms, patient staging room, and a 12-seat control room
- Endoscopy, laparoscopy, arthroscopy ultrasonography space and equipment.






FITSTFLOOR

TEAM-BASED LEARNING (TBL)

At the medical school, learning is a shared activity using contemporary technologies and instructional strategies that focus on problem-solving in a stimulating team-oriented learning environment.

- TBL hall 1 is a 90-seat tiered space designed to support large and small group learning.
- TBL observation room for presenters or observers.
- Large and small classrooms that support various group sizes.
- 12 group rooms to accommodate groups of 4-12.
- 340-seat auditorium and event support space.
- Open café seating area, fireplace, and other soft seating for individuals and informal groups.
- Fitness center and fitness studio.





Second FLOOR

LEARNING COMMUNITIES

Students are organized as members of learning communities, which are established to enhance and maximize student learning by promoting professional and social interactions among and between classes.

- Second level has classrooms and group rooms similar to first level.
- Six skyboxes overlook the auditorium to expand space through linked audiovisual technology.
- Information commons and library.
- Student commons composed of four separate learning communities complete with kitchens, lockers, and social space.
- Game room and a reflection room.
- Office of Student and Resident Affairs.

THIRD FLOOR


Office of the Dean, faculty offices and collegium, media room, Department of Pathology and Office of the Medical Examiner, Information Technology, and support services.

FOURTH, FIFTH AND SIXTH FLOORS

To be redeveloped in the future to support the medical school's research strategy.

SEVENTH FLOOR

Office of the Medical Examiner and Forensic Pathology, more than 30,000 sq. ft. with two autopsy rooms, isolation autopsy room, law enforcement and family viewing, supporting infrastructure, anatomy and advanced anatomy labs, and a multi-purpose lab.


