It was intended to dramatically alter the delivery of mental health services, resulting in community-based services, moving away from "warehousing" persons with mental illness in hospitals and institutions. Tom Watkins will discuss the evolution of the education and mental healthcare of persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities in Michigan in the 50 years since the Act was passed, and his perspective on where further improvements are still needed.
